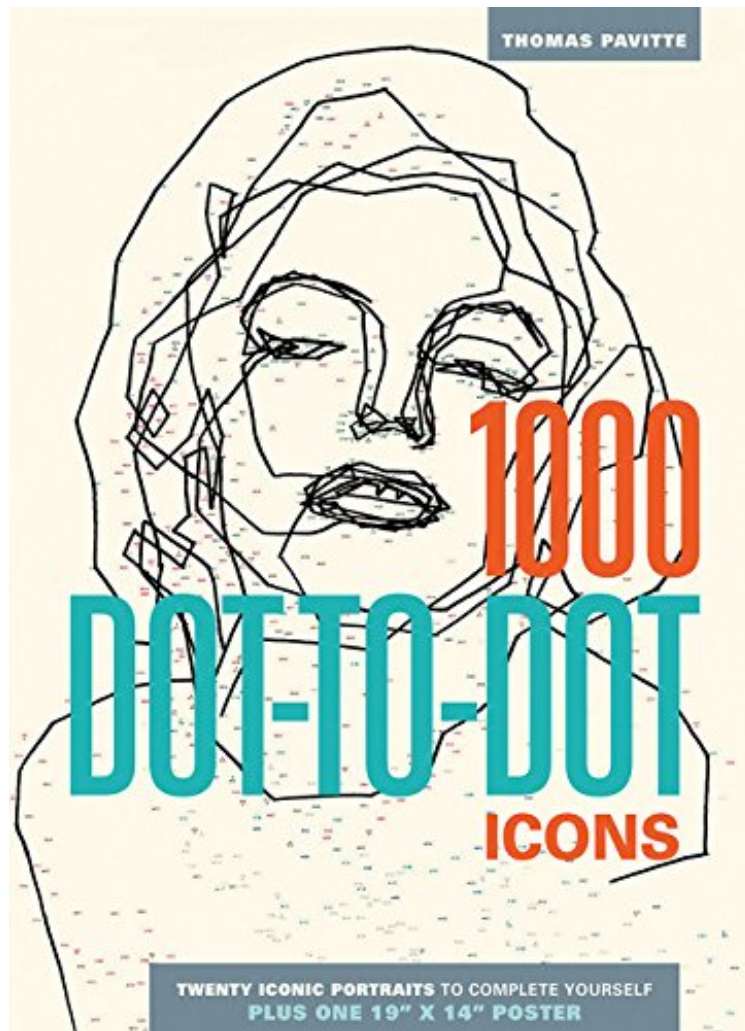

By Mitza McCordWell, this book looked like it would be a great dot-to-dot book with a more advanced level of detail than most but when I opened it up I was rather shocked at how small the dots and the numbers are. They are so small that the dots are about 1/4 the size of a .05mm pencil lead. And not only is the ink extremely light, the ink color changes with every 100 dots which I found very distracting. The designs in this book are of an abstract style which further adds to the confusion. The criss-crossing of the lines back and forth on top of each other are very confusing. I worked two of the puzzles and wasn't interested in doing any more because of my inability to see the dots/numbers. Not only did I have to have glasses, I

had to have a magnifier as well to be able to see the numbers. I have included several photos demonstrating the size of the print and the two puzzles I completed to illustrate the confusing abstract design. All in all, this book wasn't really for me.
