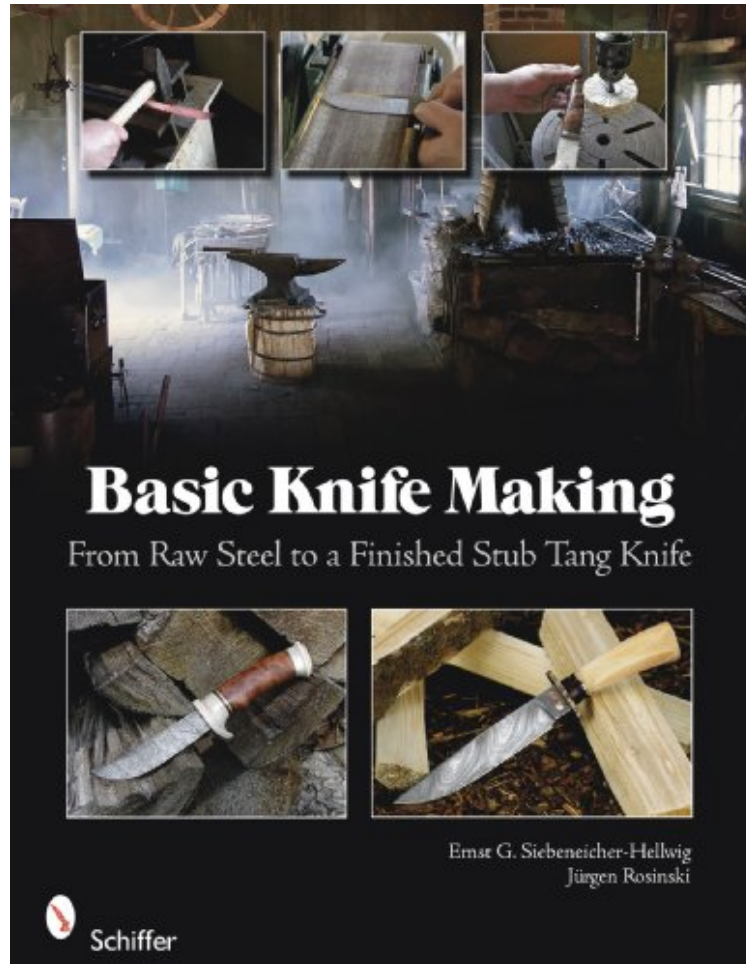

The suggestions for modifying and adapting tools are practical for a hobbyist however some of the materials are more common in Europe than the US. This absolutely is not the book for someone who wants to know how advanced hobbyists and professionals outfit a shop or do their work. For example, you will find instructions for making an make shift anvil from scrap and a grinder from a woodworking belt sander. It really is one of the finest books for entry level knife making with, once again, no marketing to wade through to get to good information. Like many knife-making books, the terms used for heat treating and some of the finer points in metallurgy are not strictly correct, but they don't err as much as other books. Other than that, I couldn't be happier with this book.
