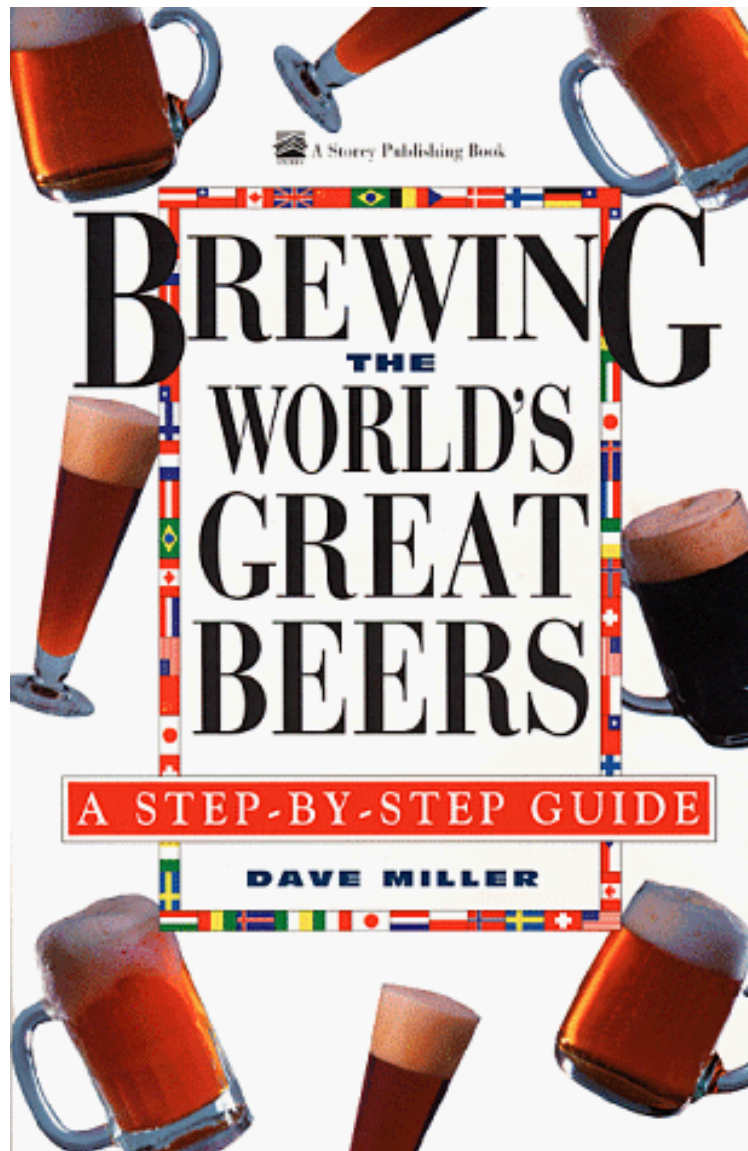

The book is separated into three parts which are essentially beginning, intermediate and advanced. The book features several recipes, each one presented in its simple malt extract form, extract with specialty grains and all grain formulations. Additionally, there are quite a few hand drawings depicting equipment and ingredients. The book is presented on the cover as a primer for brewing your favorite beers. Most people will unfortunately take this to mean commercial examples of their favorite beers. However, the title refers to the world's various beer styles and not any commercial facsimile. I think this confusion may have hurt some of Dave Miller's initial sales. I've been brewing for more than 20 years now and I have an extensive library of brewing books on the science of zymurgy. I still come back to this book from time to time because of its simple structure and concise style. There are a great many books that offer more indepth knowledge of brewing but they tend to voluminous. I think most beginning brewers are overwhelmed by information when they start brewing. This book presents everything you need to know in 150 pages. What more can you ask for?
